Park City High School will be hosting a recognition assembly on Monday June 1st from 9:55 to 10:55 a.m. hosted by Dara Smith, Counseling Department Chair. A variety of individual student, classroom, club and sport accomplishments will be recognized. At the conclusion of the event, The LIA class (Latinos in Action) will be recognizing a fellow student Robbie Borders for the work he has been doing in our community in recent months. Robbie has been holding a sign along various Park City roads that says, Smile You Are Beautiful. Inspired by Robbie's message of hope, The LIA class has assisted The Summit County Suicide Prevention Coalition in developing a suicide awareness campaign for students and adults in our community.

Suicide is now the number one cause of death for youth in ages ten to seventeen. Summit County Health Department, in collaboration with the Speedy Foundation, has donated funds to the coalition to pay for the student suicide prevention project. Students have designed dog tag necklaces that play off of Robbie's *Smile You Are Beautiful* campaign. The message is SYAB and includes the National Suicide Prevention Hotline 1 (800) 273-TALK. All Park City High School students will receive a necklace at the conclusion of the assembly and be instructed to take photos of their dog tags with a special someone, something or a place that is important to them and post to social media with the hashtag #worthlivingfor.
